



CASE STUDY: SAINT LUKE'S HEALTH SYSTEM

TeleNocturnist Program at Saint Luke's Unmatched in Timeliness, Adaptability, Expertise

Two of the Saint Luke's hospitals where Eagle's TeleNocturnist program was deployed are 25-bed critical access facilities in Missouri: Wright Memorial Hospital in Trenton and Hendrick Medical Center in Chillicothe. A third facility, Cushing Hospital in Leavenworth County, Kansas, has 54 beds.



THE CHALLENGE

Saint Luke's Health System (SLHS) was no stranger to telemedicine when it called on Eagle to provide TeleNocturnist services in three of its 16 hospitals and specialty care institutes in November 2017. SLHS had been providing its own telemedicine program to several facilities, but the drive to improve efficiencies in care prompted the company to turn over the program to Eagle, which already had a strong presence in rural hospitals in Kansas.

THE SOLUTION

Dr. Anthony Fangman, MF, FHM, MBA, has served as division chair of hospital medicine for SLHS the past 12 years. He describes the switch to Eagle's services as "seamless, with little or no management involvement, which was incredibly helpful from a division chair standpoint." He thought changing from an internal service to one led by external providers might have its rough moments, but he says there were none with Eagle. "This transition could have been difficult. However, the experience with Eagle was completely seamless," he says. The changeover happened quickly and smoothly, and immediately SLHS began to see it had made the right decision.

THE BENEFITS

- **Timely Service:** Dr. Fangman says Eagle's timeliness and responsiveness are unmatched. "We had a scheduling challenge one night," he says. "I called Eagle and they promptly stepped in and provided a solution. That's the kind of trusted relationship we have."
- **Economically Efficient:** Larger hospitals have the volume to stay busy at night, but smaller hospitals—where SLHS has expanded in recent years—just don't have enough patients to keep an onsite physician busy at night. And having a daytime hospitalist take night calls "is a tough sell" when recruiting, says Fangman. In fact, he describes it as a deterrent to recruitment. "So we cross-cover multiple hospitals at one time with Eagle Telemedicine, and economically it makes sense. They are busy all night long."
- **Peace of Mind:** Eagle's TeleNocturnists give SLHS daytime hospitalists peace of mind knowing when they come to work in the morning, there won't be any surprises with handoffs from the night shift. "Our physicians don't even remember what that anxiety used to be like," he says. "Coming in in the morning to see a note on the wall that a patient seems unstable ... all that is a part of traditional hospital medicine that has gone by the wayside, and it is so much better this way." It's a benefit that is difficult to measure numerically, but everyone understands how deeply it contributes to physician quality of life and performance at SLHS.
- **Patient, Family Acceptance:** Dr. Fangman says patients and families alike have embraced this new relationship and method of delivering care. He says, "Feedback from patients has been almost exclusively positive."
